What began in Santa Monica California nearly 30 years ago as a **(vision)** of Harold Benjamin that “no one *faces cancer alone*” has evolved into a powerful **(movement)** of nearly 60 Cancer Support Community Affiliates worldwide – including our affiliate here in Central Indiana. With an **(impact)** felt globally, Cancer Support Community has become a respected thought leader in the psycho-oncology space. Locally, we are proud to be a licensed affiliate of Cancer Support Community.

Because of our **(transformational)** effect on the lives of people touched by cancer - we are one of only four national organizations asked to join the American College of Surgeons Commission on Cancer. We sit at the table - vocal and catalytic champions of change – leading the plight to ensure that the results of the Institute of Medicine’s Report on Cancer (IOM) are implemented worldwide. The IOM recommended that every healthcare institution offering oncology services incorporate survivorship programming and programs just like what we offer here at Cancer Support Community into their service lines. Our **(IMPACT)** – on a Mother & Son



In June 2011, Indiana University Health sponsored our 7th Annual Survivors Symposium featuring renowned ABC journalist – Lynn Sherr. Among the more than 120 people who attended sat *Evon Echols*. Evon listened intently to the panel of doctors and emotionally to the panel of survivors as significant information and stories were shared.

We noticed her reflecting on what she’d heard and offered her a butterfly to release in celebration of her *own* cancer survivorship. She smiled and nodded – she looked sweetly strong. It wasn’t until weeks later that we learned she was facing a grim prognosis. But that is typical – the faces of cancer survivors are usually sweet and strong.

Weeks later, Evon came to Cancer Support Community (CSC) with her son Steven for our Kids Connect™ program. Here, Steven could talk with other young people his age about the struggles of witnessing his mother battle cancer. Ever since that night Steven has become somewhat of a fixture around here! He chose CSC as the place to do his community service for his 5th grade class project. He came with Evon and his father Steven to stuff envelopes, and to organize our *Anthem Blue Cross Blue Shield* resource library. It was during this time that we realized the true love that exists between a *Mother and a Son*. We witnessed a strong women being firm yet gentle with a bright young boy full of energy and is quite inquisitive. She may have cancer but she has not lost her mothering skills! Together – they make a great team... partners in the fight. You can’t help but smile when you see him hug his mother tight and respond “yes m’am” when she calls his name.

Evon is a strong woman of faith. She finds refuge not only in God but she says she finds refuge at Cancer Support Community too. Evon and Steven are poignant examples of the very brave and steadfast courage many cancer survivors possess. This is a story of our **(impact)** on a *Mother and a Son*.

Support Services

Emotional support is the cornerstone of our program. **496** support group sessions were held with **2,244** visits.



Wellness

926 visits were made to **208** yoga, belly dancing, *Cooking for Wellness*, and other programs aimed at strengthening ones mind as well as their body.

Education

672 visits to **65** education workshops covering multiple topics including *Cancer 101* and *Frankly Speaking About Cancer*.



2010 (IMPACT) Report



640 people participated in CSC’s life-enhancing programs **4,407** times.



Our 2010 member satisfaction survey found that **90%** of respondents find our programs help them feel better able to cope with cancer and feel less alone.

Most cancer patients are busy with their everyday lives – tending to their family and career – when the diagnosis is confirmed. But the diagnosis of cancer often changes lives forever. It stops us in our tracks with so many questions and...decisions. I learned I had cancer when a ruptured colon due to diverticulitis sent me to the doctor. Four months later they found the hidden stage 3 rectal tumor. In that moment, my life as I knew it ceased to exist and I began searching for my “new normal”. Fortunately, I found a flyer introducing Cancer Support Community and they have helped me find a sense of normalcy.

I became a member of Cancer Support Community in June 2009 and participate in as many seminars and programs as I can at the main Campus on West 71st street and on the South Side. My weekly support group on the South Side of Indianapolis is remarkable. Here, cancer survivors can share everything - from our feelings about having cancer in us but that it does not define us - to how our family and friends are dealing with our diagnosis. It is such a comfort to be surrounded by people who really understand what you’re going through when faced with cancer.
